






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Our Mission

Guided by local communities disproportionately affected by HIV/AIDS in the Southern United States, the four COMPASS Coordinating Centers are working collaboratively to build capacity among organizations, institutions, and other entities to reduce HIV/AIDS disparities in care and advance equities in the Southern United States.









Guiding Principles



Meaningful Involvement of People Living with HIV/AIDS (MIPA)

We aim to ensure that people living with and most affected by HIV are involved in every level of decision making.

We recognize the *meaningful involvement* of people living with HIV/AIDS in *all levels* of funding initiatives.



Intersectionality & Social Justice, Emphasizing Racial Justice

We recognize that *social privilege* and *oppression* influence access to and allocation of resources / services based on race, culture, gender, sexuality, language, class, age, & ability.

We affirm the importance of advancing justice by *increasing access* to resources/services among groups *disproportionately affected* by HIV.

We aim to *increase equity* of access and resources by centering efforts that *reflect the demographics of the most impacted members of our communities*.

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

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Transformative Grants Programmatic Focus Areas



Emory University Grant Making Initiative

The Emory University Rollins School of Public Health COMPASS Coordinating Center grant making initiative seeks to:

 Create long-term, sustainable change in leaders, organizations, and ultimately, communities by supporting capacity building strategies that strengthen the infrastructure and support the viability of HIV/AIDS serving organizations.












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
Focus Areas











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Focus Area (1): Sustaining and Advancing Initiatives

- Consolidate gains from existing efforts for long-term success.
- Require clear plans for sustaining and enhancing initiatives.
- Emphasize reassessment of goals, strategies, and methods.
- Focus on long-term project sustainability and stakeholder support.
- Expansion of existing projects allowed, not funding for ongoing projects.
- Areas include project adaptation, resource optimization, strategic planning, knowledge management, technological innovations, and quality assurance.



Sustaining and Advancing Initiatives: Examples

- Comprehensive project evaluations for improvement.
- Expanding HIV testing services in underserved areas.
- Strengthening local healthcare partnerships for comprehensive care.
- Enhancing data collection for evidence-based decision-making.
- Developing disaster preparedness plans for service continuity.
- International collaborations for HIV/AIDS best practice sharing.

Focus Area (2): Mentoring and Twinning

- Partnerships with experienced organizations for operational enhancement.
- Twin organization acts as a mentor, sharing insights and practices.
- Projects must show how twinning enhances operations and service delivery.
- Focus on expanding impact, especially in new or underserved populations.
- Funding mainly for the organization being mentored.
- Areas include cross-sector collaboration, resource mobilization, problem-solving, strategic outreach, service delivery innovation, and public health strategies.

Organizational Mentoring and Twinning: Examples

- Twinning for advanced HIV/AIDS treatment and patient support training.
- Collaborative implementation of peer support and outreach programs.
- Learning from mentor organizations for administrative and operational efficiency.



Focus Area (3): Community/ System Level Intervention

- Focus on transforming community norms and behaviors regarding HIV/AIDS.
- Tackle broader social determinants for holistic community health.
- Requires collaboration with multiple organizations for effective service.
- Projects should involve equitable decisionmaking and resource mobilization.
- Encourage innovative strategies for prevention, care, and community engagement.

Community/Systems Level Interventions: Examples

- Advocacy for policy changes to reduce barriers to HIV testing and treatment.
- Transportation subsidy programs for healthcare access.
- Centralized referral systems for streamlined HIV care.
- Services addressing language and cultural barriers.
- City-wide financial assistance programs for healthcare costs for low-income individuals.




What are we looking for?



- Proposals that articulate the need in their priority population with respect to HIV
- Alignment between funding opportunity & grant needs
- Community Engagement
- Realistic proposals (budget, staffing, timeframe of deliverables)
 - Work plan needs to match the budget
- SUSTAINABILITY!









Things To Know

- Maximum Request: \$100,000
- Evaluation Requirements
 - Quarterly Reports, Evaluation Plan, Work Plan, Final Report
- Capacity Building Requirements
 - Monthly Coaching Meetings, Bi-Monthly Project Officer Calls
- Funds cannot support HIV test kits, harm reduction equipment, or support direct provision of medical personnel including CEUs
- Submitted documents are subject to change with assistance from Emory team upon selection.









Capacity Building Proposals



- Priority will be given to organizations led by and/or serving marginalized communities (including MSM of color, women of color, Latinx, transgender and gender nonconforming individuals).
- Support for staff positions and/or consultants are acceptable requests under this funding initiative.
- Will work collaboratively to develop evaluation plans & revise work plans as needed if selected.
- Grant recipients that choose to hire consultants to assist with capacity building efforts are not required to work with a particular consultant, although the selected consultant must be approved as part of the final stage of the application process.

We recognize and value intersectional practice, especially social and racial justice, MIPA, collaboration and commitment, and openness and transparency










Trauma Informed Care Organizational Change



- Actions that transform culture, infrastructure, and internal processes, such as hiring, training, and screening practices, and policies and procedures.
- Requires intentionality, commitment, and management
- Typically includes three major phases:
 - 1. Pre-implementation
 - 2. Implementation
 - 3. Sustainability

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
Why Trauma Informed Care Organizational Change?




- The landscape of HIV has been stagnant
 - Lack of support and resources to engage in structural change required to end the HIV epidemic.
- This ultimately trickles down to harming not only the communities organizations serve but their staff as well.
- We know TIC org change improves:
 - Employee development, employee engagement, employee retention, service user satisfaction, service engagement, or service innovation or enhancements.


Our Mission

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Our Vision

We envision a better South for people living with HIV, one where every person has access to high-quality health care and essential support services, free from stigma & discrimination.

We also envision a South where every person understands their risk for HIV transmission, receives routine screening, and has access to a full range of prevention interventions and harm reduction services.

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Transformative Grant Focus



FOCUS Area One : Intervention Development or Adaptation

- Original interventions with a proposed comprehensive formative process that takes into consideration existing programming gaps and relevance to the culture and experiences of community of focus
- Adaptation of existing evidence-based intervention(s) with a proposed comprehensive process and justification for developing additional content that specifically addresses HIVrelated stigma




FOCUS Area Two: Intervention Implementation

 Proposed projects in this focus area should result in the implementation of an intervention that was previously developed and piloted by the applicant. In this focus area, your project should culminate in a minimum of one complete cycle of your intervention with program evaluation throughout entire process.









What Is An "Intervention"

By intervention, we mean any combination of program elements or strategies <u>designed</u> to reduce HIV-related stigma both internal and external by either:

- Influencing knowledge, attitudes, beliefs, or skills among PLHIV;
- Increasing social support for PLHIV; or
- Creating supportive environments, policies, and resources for PLHIV









What we are looking for




SAC is planning to award up to \$100,000 in direct funds for applications that are:

- Intentional in the application of MIPA Principles
- Demonstrative of the applicant's alignment with Gilead COMPASS Initiative Guiding Principles
- Located in communities that currently lack stigma reduction resources for PLWH
- Led by members of the community
- Clearly defined and developed with appropriate SMART goals and objectives












Grant Program Timeline 2024-2025




Transformative Grant Focus

- Support the establishment of infrastructures and programs to enhance access to employment, education, transportation, housing, finance wellness, and/or healthcare for people at risk for acquiring and/or living with HIV/AIDS in the US South.
- Our aim is to collaborate with Christian and interfaith partners; create inclusive faith spaces (virtual and/or inperson) for LGBTQ persons and people living with HIV; create opportunities for physical, emotional, and financial wellness; and educate emerging faith leaders and faith communities who will impact how communities respond to HIV/AIDS in the future.









WHAT MAKES A STRONG APPLICATION?

- Clearly articulate how your project will address persons living with and/or impacted by HIV and be connected to faith communit(ies)
 - Letters of Support will strengthen the case that you have an established commitment with collaborative organizations for your project
- Clearly articulate how you will deliver your program, including the planned platform that will be used for communication.
- Don't worry about your project being "too small". We want to support grassroots efforts that can reach deep into the heart of community need.
- Think focused rather than big, broad programs or initiatives. We want to support grassroots campaigns that can reach deep into a community rather than campaigns that try to reach everyone across the spectrum.










What are we looking for?



- Innovative approaches to addressing HIV-stigma in faith communities
- Demonstrated partnerships and impact with multiple organizations or faith communities
- Ability to "hit the ground running" with funding
- Strategy to communicate to a broad cross-section of communities and priority groups
- Clear plan for implementation







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Funding Parameters



- Grant cycle will be from June 1, 2024 September 2025
- Funds must be expended by September 2025
- Reports:
- Quarter activities reports (Due 7/15/24, 10/31/24, 01/15/25, 4/14/25, 07/15/25, 10/31/25)
- Current Transformative Grantees receiving Transformative Grant funding from other COMPASS Initiative Coordinating Centers are not eligible for funding
- This grant will not fund individuals, general operations, endowments, or fundraising events.
- Grant recipients will be required to provide a narrative report and a budget report at the end of the grant cycle

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

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Why so much emphasis on evaluation?



Our goal is to identify high-impact, scalable and fundable interventions that are:

- Effectively strengthen the core capabilities of emerging organizations and develop skills in implementing traumainformed care in organizational practices.
- Effectively shift attitudes and behaviors to improve HIV prevention and care; and build support for HIV/AIDS in faithbased groups.
- Create models that can be effectively replicated across other areas in the South.





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TRANSFORMATIVE GRANTS

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Investing in the South to address the Southern HIV epidemic

Eligibility Requirements





Geographic Location

Applicants must be located in AND provide services in one of 12 Southern states: AL, AR, FL, GA, KY, LA, MS, NC, OK, SC, TN, or TX.



Award Amount The maximum amount varies by CC



Non-Profit Status

Applicants must be non-profit, tax-exempt 501(c)(3) organizations or have a fiscal sponsor.



Complete Organizational Survey (Emory)

Grant Period

Applicants must be able to complete work proposed within an 15-month period beginning June 2024 and ending September 31, 2025.

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One Application Per Agency



Funding amount varies by CC. Focused on supporting the development and implementation of programs and activities that addressing:

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Unallowable Activities



- Projects that focus on or include pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP);
- Procedures or policies that exclude community members from receiving adequate and efficient health care, safe shelter, advocacy services, counseling, and other assistance based on their actual or perceived sex, age, immigration status, race, religion, sexual orientation, gender identity, mental health condition, physical health condition, criminal record, work in the sex industry, or the age and/or gender of their children;
- Procedures or policies that compromise the confidentiality of information and/or privacy of persons being served at or by the applying organization/individual;
- Project designs and budgets that fail to account for the access needs of individuals with disabilities, with limited English proficiency, or who are deaf or hard of hearing;
- Projects that place a criteria or requirement for community members to access services;
- Project activities that promote or create a unsafe, uncomfortable, or counter-productive work environment;
- Project activities that exclude staff that are representative of the community members being targeted through this grant project from serving in leadership or advisory capacity;
- Grant funds may not be used to provide legal representation in civil and criminal matters, such as family law cases (divorce, custody, visitation, and child support), housing cases, consumer law cases, and other legal cases.

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
Application Components



- Applications must include three major sections
 - Project Cover Page
 - Project Narrative
 - Supplemental Materials
- Required Supplemental Materials (varies per CC Read RFP for actual requirements)
 - Project Budget Template
 - Work Plan (not required for UH proposals)
 - 501(c)(3) Verification (or letter from fiscal sponsor or agent)
 - Audit (if your organization does not undergo an audit, then attach your most recent IRS Form 990)
 - Board of Directors List
 - Diversity Table
 - Optional: Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) or Letters of Support









Review Process



- Independent review committee
 - Community members from each of the twelve (12) eligible states
 - Representing each of the programmatic areas
 - Representing our priority populations
 - Following rubric to score applications
